in the class of 1969, and they have been married 49 years.

They both attended Texas State University in San Marcos.

She always wanted to be a teacher, he wanted to be a biologist.

After college she went straight into teaching, he worked for the Fish and Wildlife department, for four years before working at UCISD.

He continued to work for 17 more years for the fish and wildlife department part-time while teaching.

Her career as an educator spans 46 years.

"I have taught so many years that I have had students of former students and students who are now grandparents of my students," said Sylvia.

"I even had a student teacher come work in my classroom that I taught as a young girl," added Sylvia.

She has taught first, second, third, fourth and

sixth grade for the district.

He has worked with fifth-, sixth-, seventh- and eighth- graders at Batesville, and grades nine through 12 at the high school, for 38 years.

"I have enjoyed teaching at every grade level," shared Sylvia.

During a recent interview, the couple bantered about their experiences.

"I always wanted to be a teacher," Sylvia said. "My grandma was a teacher in Mexico, and she inspired me to be a teacher because she would tell me about her experiences as a teacher in Mexico."

Juan added that over the years they have seen a lot of changes at the district, and used the example of working in a classroom before the schools had central air.

"I am not ready to retire, Sylvia quipped, "I know I will want to come back."

The couple added that they have so many memories and have kept in touch with some stu-

dents over the years.

They both agreed that teaching has come with its challenges. In reflection, Juan shared, "I think we both have had very challenging students throughout the years, and I've learned it only takes a few kind words to get them on your side."

Their advice for beginning teachers: "go into teaching because you love it, because you want to make a difference in the lives of children. It is the most challenging and rewarding career."

"I love to see ex-students and see how they have become role models in our community."

Sylvia said that Hector Gonzales, president at Southwest Texas Junior College, was her student in second grade.

"What a great honor to have an ex-student become such an outstanding citizen in the community," she said.

The couple plans to move to the Dallas area to be close to their children.

Agents rescue 73 from Rio Grande River

United States Border Patrol agents assigned to Del Rio Sector rescued 73 individuals from the swift current of the Rio Grande River in five separate incidents.

All of the migrants were from Central America including unaccompanied children and family units. They were processed per U.S. Customs and Border Protection guidelines.

An increase in water release from Amistad Dam has created a high flow to the Rio Grande River and is expected to approach and remain near flood stage for the next 25 days. Water is regularly transferred downstream to meet irrigation and municipal water demand in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, which creates dangerous conditions to anyone attempting to cross the Rio Grande River and to agents operating on or near the river.

On April 12, agents from the Bracketville Station encountered 14 people stranded on an island in the middle of the Rio Grande River. Agents along with members of the Border Patrol Search Trauma and Rescue team deployed a rescue boat with swift-water equip-

ment and safely transported all the people to the U.S. side of the river.

On April 14, a CBP Air and Marine Operations helicopter pilot patrolling in the area spotted a group of 21 people stranded on the same island. The group was observed attempting to cross the swift-flowing river, only to be nearly swept away and forced to return to the island. The Del Rio Station marine unit and agents from the Bracketville Station were able to safely rescue all 21 people and transport them in a patrol boat to the U.S. side of the river.

On April 18, agents from the Bracketville Station encountered another large group of people stranded on the island unable to return to Mexico or continue crossing the river to the United States. Border Patrol marine agents responded to the area with a patrol boat and successfully rescued 28 people from the island.

On April 25, at approximately 6 p.m., Border Patrol agents from the Bracketville Station encountered a pregnant woman stranded on an island in the middle of the Rio Grande River. Agents contacted Del Rio Sec-

tor's Border Patrol Search, Trauma and Rescue team for assistance, who are trained in swift water rescue. The team of agents arrived and were able to rescue the woman and safely bring her to shore. She was transported to Val Verde Regional Medical Center for evaluation and treatment, due to her late-term pregnancy.

Also on April 25, Border Patrol agents from the Del Rio Station noticed 10 people on a raft making their way across the river to the United States. However, the raft was filling with water and one subject had fallen out into the river and was being swept away by the strong current. The Del Rio Station Riverine Unit quickly responded in their patrol boat and rescued all 10 people.

During processing, agents discovered that a 3-year-old child in the group had become separated from her mother, when the mother stayed behind on the Mexican side of the river. The Del Rio Sector Foreign Operations Branch coordinated with Mexican immigration officials who reunited the child with her mother in Mexico.
